Is your summer "bucket" list done? Ours is...sort of! An update on various summer projects at Zion's

In the beginning of the summer, most of us have our "bucket" list. This includes various home maintenance projects; a vacation; a call to Aunt Selma, who we've promised to visit for ages; maybe cleaning out a bin in the attic, etc. The church too had a summer bucket list. Here is a review of how God was active in our congregation this summer.

Send out 12 on a Youth Mission Trip to West Virginia: The youth in our congregation did some awesome work with Habitat for Humanity in West Virginia. We hammered, painted, organized, demolished and ate a lot of ice cream. The youth and adults who went worked (and played!) great with the other volunteers, also members of other Lebanon County Lutheran churches. I confess a bit of pride in seeing how well the youth and adults in our church performed during the whole week. Teenagers often get criticized for being lazy...well, not that week!!

What is next: We are busy planning for next year. In the meantime, we will be much more involved with the other youth groups in Lebanon County this year. We already have a big retreat planned for October.

✓ Try a new Summer Sunday School program: "Bible Studio." This summer we decided to try a different format for Sunday School. We called it "Bible Studio." It gave parents a chance to have fun with the Bible and their kids, using supplies people have in their homes (crayons, the internet, ovens, construction paper, etc). Attendance varied from 6 to 20 kids and adults. Every week we tried different approaches to make the stories in the Bible come alive. The feedback from parents and children was very strong. What is next: We will assess ways to improve the program, but I definitely see us trying this again. More broadly, we will continue to work on ways to help parents pass on the faith, not simply by bringing their

children to church, but also bringing the church into their homes.

Have our biggest Vacation Bible School ever: We had over 80 kids throughout the week, including many preschool families and children. Thanks to all the volunteers, especially coordinator Michele McQuiade. The kids went on an amazing Desert Journey with Jesus! The Bible stories and songs all came together to teach the children about Jesus. It was great seeing the kids sing and sign the Lord's Prayer at the church Picnic.

What is next: We hope some of the kids will come back for our Fall Carnival...and Sunday School!

Move location of Summer Picnic: Last summer it became clear that we had outgrown the pavilion at Jonestown Park. So we moved the picnic to Levitz Park. Deb Reiner and crew did a fantastic job preparing and running the program. The location worked out great.

What is next: We hope to return to Levitz Park next summer!

An update on various summer projects at Zion's

Send out two missionaries: This summer we sponsored and sent out two missionaries, Michael Soneson and Meghan Bryte. Michael heads off to England to work at a Christian Drug Rehab center. Meghan will work in Mexico; among other tasks she will teach English as a Second Language.

What is next: We look forward to reading their blogs about their experiences. This October 7 we will welcome home the two missionaries we sent out last year, Sam and Elizabeth, on our Global Mission Sunday. We rejoice in how Christ worked through them this past year.

Buy the adjacent property and renovate it: The congregation approved the purchase of the property late this Spring. By July, we had signed the papers, including taking a loan from the Church's Endowment Fund. Since then, there has been a tremendous amount of work done on the house. We thank Lynn Kleinfelter for leading this renovation crew.

What is next: Continue renovations, hopefully opening for a renter in the coming weeks. We do have renters lined up, but we want to do as much as we can while it is empty.

We do still need people to help repair and clean. See article later in newsletter.

In the long run, we remain very open to where God may lead us with this property. It may become home to a non-profit, it may house staff of our church or another church or it may simply remain a rental property. For the next few years, it will likely be a rented property to help us pay off the mortgage.

- Offer a children's comfort area instead of staffed nursery: Rather than staff a nursery with volunteers for the summer (and have them in an un-air-conditioned room), we set up an area in the back of the Social Hall where parents could play with their "active" children during worship and also watch a TV broadcast of the service. (If we could just avoid getting struck by lightning the broadcast idea would work a bit better...) What is next: In the fall, we will move back to a staffed nursery, but it will be staffed by a limited number of volunteers. It will also begin after the children's message.
- Get struck by lightning: Actually, this was not on our bucket list! We were struck and this caused damage to the organ, the phone/internet devices and part of the sound system. So far the damages have been limited in their financial impact, but a headache nonetheless.

What is next: By the time you receive this newsletter, all the repairs should be done! However, when it comes to a building this big, it may be that we only discover things at a later date.

As you can tell, is has been a very busy Summer here. Most of this newsletter is devoted to events this Fall – Rally Day, the return of the choir, Global Mission Sunday and so forth. But before we move ahead, I wanted us to look back and rejoice over all that God has done with and through us this Summer.

Because you asked....a congregation member's question to the Pastor:

Is clapping okay in church?

Yes. As Psalm 47:1 declares: "Clap your hands, all you peoples; shout to God with loud songs of joy." In the book of Isaiah, the LORD declares that even the trees will clap with joy! (55:12). Many congregations, clap frequently in worship, especially during singing.

My observation is that people at this church tend not to clap during worship, except after a choir song. Some feel that this makes the choir's singing into a performance for the people instead of praise to God. Others feel their heart so stirred after a choir's song, they cannot help but clap! Some clap because they don't want to be rude.

Personally, I think clapping can be a great part of worship. While I understand concerns about performance, I think it is good to allow people to express their gratitude and thanksgiving in all variety of ways.

It is always tough to balance humility and praise. It is a sin not to acknowledge our sinfulness; it is just as much as a sin to deny God's grace and power to work through us.



Highlights from August 9, 2012 Council Meeting

1) PASTOR'S REPORT: Pastor highlighted the immensity of the commitment made by council members, noting the contributions of members past and present. He also noted the smooth transition of leadership for VBS and the annual picnic, thanks to the assistance of Janet Bird who lead these events in the past. Pastor has received preliminary information concerning storm-water run off fees the church and cemetery will have to pay. He will attend borough meetings to learn more.

2) FINANCE: Approval was given to open a separate checking account for the "Mohn" rental property as maintenance is done and future rents will be collected.

3) EVANGELISM: A request from Jonestown Outreach pantrY for a donation of 4 tables & chairs was approved. The next new member class will be on Rally Day, Sunday, Sept. 9. A missionary that Zion's sponsored will visit us on October 7.

4) PRE-SCHOOL: Has hired Ashley Rose as an aide and Karen Brown Pautz as aide/substitute.

5) COUNCIL APPOINTMENTS: Tom Mohn and Michael Johnsen have been appointed to council to complete the remaining terms of Angela Watson and Angela Evans who resigned their positions. Both terms will expire in December of this year.

6) SOCIAL HALL/KITCHEN: A layout plan was approved; the next phase is determining various projects within this layout, hopefully at September or October meeting.

Financial Update: July Revenue: \$12,835.32; Expenses: \$17,983.46. YTD Income (Loss): (-\$7,238.68) Note: Our July expenses greatly exceeded our July revenues in large part because of our closing and transaction costs on the property purchase.

RENTAL (Mohn) PROPERTY UPDATE:

The figurative heavy lifting, purchasing the property, has been completed. Now the literal heavy lifting has begun. The property management team headed by Lynn Kleinfelter has begun the

demolition/reconstruction phase of preparing the property for a renter by Sept. 1, 2012. That may be an ambitious deadline, but we're aiming high.

The clean & paint crew headed by Ed Ludwig will follow the 'skilled' laborers for the final prep. Two items of note for the congregation:
