[Jesus] sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me." (Mark 9:35-37)

Multiple times in the Gospels, Jesus uplifts the importance of children, tends to their particular needs, and commands His followers to "welcome them". In my sermon on September 23, I mentioned that, here at Zion's, we work hard to ensure all children experience welcome, know love, and are encouraged to grow in faith. And, it's true: through Sunday school, Rejoicing Spirits, children's choir, King's Kids, Vacation Bible School, Day Camp, children's sermons, and other activities throughout the year, we seek to meet the needs of children and their families and look for ways they can share their gifts and talents in this place. By so doing, we not only follow through on the promises we made to them in baptism, but we also experience God and a foretaste of the Kingdom.

Importantly, Zion's also welcomes children in worship, believing that they, too, have praise and thanks to offer to God, that they learn how to worship *by* worshiping, and that our community of faith is incomplete without their presence and participation. This deeply held belief is part of what drew me to Zion's, and one of the reasons Seth and I are so grateful to be raising Madelyn in this community of faith. I believe wholeheartedly in the need for children to be in worship and I also recognize that, some days, worshiping with children can be *hard*—for the kids!, for their parents, and for the congregation. My home congregation shared these ideas about we, as a congregation, can ensure that worship is a welcoming place for all:

Parent and caregivers can help us say "Welcome" to your children by:

- Making worship a priority in your child's life, and in your life, too. Talk positively and joyfully about church so your children catch on that church is a good place to be.
- If you have young children, sitting close to the front where they can see what is going on. Help them follow along in the bulletin. If your little one isn't quite ready for the front, pick a row near the back for easy access to the hallway and/or nursery if needed.
- Picking up a children's worship bag on your way into worship. If you bring some of your child's favorite items from home, please pick quiet items.
- Not expecting too much from young children. It is okay if they cannot sit through an entire service or a sermon without a break in the hallway, especially if worship is new to them. Regular participation in worship will help set the expectations for worshipful behavior.
- Knowing when to say when! When a crying child cannot be comforted or is just having "one of those days," as we all do, please give your child a break. Take them down to the Gathering Area where you will be able to watch worship on the TV and your little one can regroup. When you are ready, come back into the sanctuary. This will give both you and your child a more positive worship experience.

- Volunteer as a family to be ushers or greeters so your child can participate as a worship leader. Children love to help and we love when they help lead worship. This will help instill in them a sense of belonging and identity within our faith family.
- Volunteer to work in the nursery every so often so that we can provide a consistently staffed nursery for your child (when needed) and other children who may not be as familiar with worship
- If your child has questions about worship, encourage them to ask me before or after worship. I love questions!

Other adults in our congregation can help us say "Welcome" to children and their families by:

- Being patient! Children have shorter attention spans that are challenged by the length of a worship service. Please extend grace to our children as families teach them how to worship.
- Modeling worshipful behavior by refraining from conversation during the worship service (including the offering and holy communion), singing and praying along.
- Introducing yourself to those sitting around you, especially if they have children or teens. This will allow you to meet someone you don't know, whether a member or a visitor. It will help the children/teens feel welcome. Finally, by establishing a relationship with those around you, you open the door to providing assistance and support as the need arises to children who are learning how to worship.
- Including children in the Sharing of the Peace. It is often their favorite part of the service!
- Volunteering to work in our nursery every now and then so we can provide a consistently staffed nursery. While your children may have outgrown the nursery years ago, the next generation (or two! or three!) is still nursery age and needs loving, attentive adults to tend to their care.
- When the opportunity presents itself, complementing children and parents on a child's good behavior after the service. Your encouragement could be what inspires them to come back to worship next week.

At every baptism, our congregation promises to help parents and grandparents raise their children in the faith. This includes welcoming children to worship, providing for faith education, seeing that they have access to a Bible, and supporting caregivers when children aren't in a 'worshipful' mood. We need your continued support to fulfill these promises. Right now, we are particularly in need of people who are willing to work in the nursery from time to time. While we welcome babies and children in worship, we recognize that that's not always the right choice for every family—offering a consistently staffed nursery ensures that families who choose to do so will always have the option of nursery care. Families with children and grandchildren, I would also like to hear from you how I, and our congregation, can best support you as you raise your child in the church. What would be helpful? Is there any interest in a Children's Church model (where kids leave for a lesson during the sermon time)? Are their aids we can provide you to help teach your child about the worship service? Council Highlights from September 2018 meeting

• Shared opening devotions using the "Taking Faith Home" resource that is now included in every Sunday's bulletin

- Pastor Caitlin shared an update from the Jonestown Council of Churches: Discussed changing the day of the Thanksgiving worship service (to either the Sunday evening or Tuesday prior to Thanksgiving) to accommodate those who may be traveling; discussed changing the Lent breakfast to be a "family" event, welcoming men, women, and children; agreed that the Council of Churches would take on the "Power Packs" project at Jonestown Elementary. The Council of Churches welcomes more representatives from each of the borough churches--if you are interested, please see Pastor Caitlin. Next meeting is Thursday October 25 at 6 PM
- Approved the purchase of additional youth choir robes from the Memorial Fund
- Approved the purchase of a new NRSV Pulpit Bible from the Memorial Fund. The red one, which has been used for years, is a Bible translation that we no longer use. This Bible will be placed in the church library, together with other pulpit Bibles that are no longer in use.
- Discussed the problems we have been having with microphones in both the Social Hall and Sanctuary. Some of these problems are due to the age of the microphones, other problems are anticipated due to the frequency we use no longer being available to us in the next year or two. One quote has been received to update the system, another is being configured right now. Council approved spending up to \$2000 from the Bill Haniman memorial fund to update the system in the Social Hall. Council approved spending up to \$2000 from the general fund to update the system in the sanctuary.
- Appointed Michele McQuaide and Dawn Wolfe to the nominating committee for 2019. The terms of four Council members expire at the end of 2018 (and are not eligible for re-election). If you are interested in serving on Council, or have a recommendation to make, please see Pastor Caitlin, Michele, or Dawn.
- Reviewed the conversation Pastor Caitlin and Tom Mohn had with the Emergency Evacuation Specialist. Tom will be appointing a Safety Team to work on the recommendations, and to plan an Evacuation Drill
- PLEASE NOTE: November Council meeting has been rescheduled to Tuesday November 6 at 7 PM.

TALES FROM THE HILLS

THOUGHTS, STORIES, AND UPDATES FROM MY YEAR OF ACCOMPIANMENT IN RWANDA

MURAHO!

Hello! Greetings from the beautiful and hilly Rwanda. Yes, folks, I made it! Our Rwanda cohort just wrapped up our three-week orientation in the capital city, Kigali. We were staying at a guesthouse in the Ramera neighborhood. Our country coordinator, Janelle, kept us busy seeing different parts of Kigali, visiting and meeting church officials, and trying some lots of different restaurants. Our cohort spent a few hours each day in Kinyarwanda class. I am pleased to report, that I do know more Kinyarwanda than I did a month ago! We had three different teachers. Colombe taught us the basics and challenged us to talk as much as we could to get used to new letter combinations and difficult words. Our cohort was particularly fond of the word for butterfly, ikinyugunyugu. Denyse was our noun teacher. In her lessons we formulated basic sentences and expanded our vocabulary. Emmanuel taught us as many verbs as he could and how to conjugate them into different tenses—while it could be confusing, he spelled it out for us in a way that we could all understand. Our last dinner together in Kigali before we set off to our placements was "ikinyarwanda guza," only in Kinyarwanda. Our three teachers, Janelle, Ben (an alum of the program who surprised us in Kigali), and the six of us ate pizza and did our best to communicate through gestures and broken sentences. It was not pretty, but we laughed quite a bit and the pizza was great.

If I had a nickel for every person who said Gicumbi is the coldest part of Rwanda, I'd be able to buy at least seven kilos of passion fruit (amatunda in Kinyarwanda). Even though the Gicumbi province is closer to the equator, the high elevation keeps it cool and there is almost always a slight breeze. I am living in Kageyo, a small village on the side of a hill over looking a valley. On a clear day, you can see the volcanos in the distance in the western most part of Rwanda. I am staying with Pastor Caleb and his wife Mama Haleluya. Pastor Caleb and Anne came to pick me up in Kigali. Anne very good English and Pastor Caleb thought it would be helpful if she came along. Their friends, Robert and Phionah, who live I Kigali, drove us an hour north to Kageyo instead of taking a bus. When we arrived, Mama H had milk tea and fruit ready for us with a hot lunch following close behind that. Neighbors from all over town stopped in to meet me and welcome me. At the end of second meal, Anne began to sing and before I knew it, we were all dancing and singing together. It was a wonderful welcome.
