Dear Members and Friends of Zion's:

Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia! God's grace and peace be with you this Eastertide day.

A few weeks ago, I was at Jonestown Elementary school volunteering with the Power Packs program (new this year, an initiative that sends ingredients and a recipe for one health, supper meal, as well as some snacks, home with children in need each Thursday). As we started to roll the packed bags down the hallway, one of Zion's youngsters stopped me in the hallway: "Pastor Caitlin, I have a question for you." "Sure, what's that?" "Who created God?" You know, just a simple question in the hallway on a Thursday afternoon!

I answered that question to the best of my ability, and we continued down the hallway. Fifty yards later, another Zion's child called out "Pastor Caitlin! I'm getting baptized after Lent!" "Oh yeah?", I asked (for this was the first time I had heard of this scheduling note...though we had talked about the possibility of baptism for quite some time). "What's baptism?" that child's friend asked her. "It's when you become a child of God, and it's what you do before you can have communion", she replied. "Wow", I thought as I promised we'd talk with her parents soon about scheduling that baptism.

When another family arrived for Good Friday worship, the mom told me that her four year old had been dancing around the house around 3 PM that afternoon (which scripture tells us is that time that Jesus died), singing "Jesus is dead! Jesus is dead!" When she asked him why he was *happy* about that, he simply replied "Because He's coming back alive on Sunday, mom!" with a bit of a sense of "Why don't you know that?!"

As I led the communion liturgy during Easter Dawn worship yesterday morning, I looked out to see another one of our children with her hands in the air, modeling the *orans* posture used during Holy Communion, and mouthing the Words of Institution.

"And a child shall lead them" (Isaiah 11:6). Stories like these bring me so much joy, and instill quite a bit of hope. The children that God has entrusted to our care at Zion's *get it*. The welcome they receive in worship, the stories they learn in Sunday school, the songs they learn in choir, the lessons they hear in children's sermons, the ways they participate in Rejoicing Spirits...all of these experiences help to form them in faith, and, in turn, allow them to *teach and inspire adults* in our faith, too.

On Sunday, May 12, the children and youth of Zion's will once again lead us in worship. In planning for this biannual event, our young people get the opportunity to really study worship, examining and questioning why we do what we do, and sometimes exploring how we might do worship a little differently. They get to share the gifts of faith and song and leadership that God has given to them and, importantly, they get to "try on" what it is like to serve the church in a public leadership role. In addition to raising up engaged, faithful lay people, it is always my hope that we might also raise up women and men for pastoral and diaconal rostered ministry, ensuring that the Church's needs for public leaders will be met for generations to come.

Please plan to join us for worship on May 12 as we hear the Gospel through the eyes and ears and words of children and youth, bear witness to the work of God in their lives and offer encouragement for their courageous and faith filled leadership. There will also be a spectacular combined adult and youth choir that day. See you then.

TALES FROM THE HILLS

THOUGHTS, STORIES, AND UPDATES FROM MY YEAR OF SERVICE IN RWANDA

TEACHER HOPE

As you all know from my last email, I finally got set up with a regular schedule here in Kageyo. I work half days at two schools that could not be more different.

I walk to school at 7:30 on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Located just down the road (and down a steep hill) the Kageyo Government School is one of the two free public schools in the village. Unlike any school I've been in back home, but typical for



Here I am teaching my senior ones at GS Kageyo. On this day we were talking about nouns; countable nouns like people, desks, books, pineapples and non-countable nouns like water, air, sand, and salt. We learned about when to use much, many, any, some and a few others

those in Rwanda, this is school is open air. Buildings which house classrooms are spread out all over the campus, but there are no hallways connecting them. Students stay in the same classroom most of the day and the teachers are the ones who move between the rooms. Teachers' home base is a staff room, where there are over 50 desks where teachers can prepare lessons, mark exams, and take a break. GS Kageyo is a secondary school and a primary school. I work in the secondary level with 60 other teachers—this school is huge. Each level has between 6 and 10 sections. I work with senior one students, our equivalent to 7th grade. I see 6 out of the 7 sections of senior one in a week. Each section is made up of around 50-60 students. So if you do the math, GS Kageyo has around 350 senior one students and over 2,000 students. Most of my kiddos live in the Gihembe (Ghee-hem-bay) Refugee Camp not far from my house or school. A lot of (DRC), but the school has new students enroll who have just arrived in Rwanda often.

As you can imagine, classroom management of 60 adolescents is difficult. A lot of other teachers bring a stick to class and give the students a whack when they are not behaving—something I refuse to do and discuss with teachers almost daily. It has not been easy to teach students English when there are at radically different levels of ability and previous knowledge. Resources at the school are scarce. I use one student work

book, a few pieces of chalk, and the blackboard every day for instruction. The students have a blank notebook and a pen. We make do, but it could not be more different from teaching in the states with access to computers, projectors, libraries, extra books, crafting materials, the list could go on.



Pictured here is my favorite class, Senior One C. They are sweethearts. I am lucky to teach them Monday, Wednesday and Friday—all the hours they have English for the week. These students are huge fans of Simon Says and Pictionary games!

KING SALOMON ACADEMY (KSA)

On Tuesdays and Thursdays I take a 30 minute motorcycle ride through Byumba (Bee-yoom-bah) to King Salomon Primary School. The Anglican church has a very strong presence in the Gicumbi District and KSA is one of the churches private schools. Radically different from GS Kageyo, KSA has very small class sizes and only one section of each level. There are around 25 students in each class from Primary 1-6 and there are only 6 full time teachers.

Most of the work I do at King Salomon is hanging out with students and assisting teachers. I arrive during lunch time.


I sit with the staff and chat while we share our meal. After the students eat lunch, they have time to play outside. I love jumping rope and throwing tennis balls around with these cute kiddos. The past three months there have been two other volunteers from the US working at KSA. William and Wanda are a retired couple from Idaho. Their church is a sponsor and partner with King Salomon, and they send a volunteer almost every year. William and I sit in the library during recess. Sometimes we read to students, sometimes students read to us, other times I draw pictures or work on puzzles with kids. The library is a great resource for the school. Students are allowed to check out books and read them at home. There are teacher resources and art supplies that past visitors have donated to the school. Once the students start class in the afternoon, I am left to reorganize the library—no small feat! I've helped sort books into levels for different readers, which they still have not figured out how to put back on the correct shelf. The rest of my day at KSA is typing exams or worksheets for teachers, grading homework or quizzes, and making charts or posters for the teachers to use in lessons.



This is what the bookshelves can look like after library time. The books are well loved, but the kids need some pointers on putting them back on the shelf! I have a few eager volunteers who help me organize before class.

NEW NEIGHBOR

Most Rwandans are not fans of dogs and only keep them around to guard their houses. In my neighborhood, dogs run loose at night. They will all start howling late at night, I like to think it's a twilight bark like in 101 Dalmatians. Anyway, our neighbor just got a new puppy! Most of





the time he is kept in their house compound, but one day I heard him crying outside my window. He wandered through our gate and we've been best friends ever since. Like many dogs, he loves chicken and belly rubs. I am trying to teach him to sit, using Kinyarwanda commands...we'll see!

PRINCE IN PRINCE

I was blessed to be able introduce my sister and best friend to my host family, friends, and this amazing country. We jam packed a week with church, home visits, school, museums, market trips, and a safari. It was a whirlwind adventure with so much laughter. My heart is still overflowing from that week.



SPRING RETREAT

The volunteers got together for our spring retreat in mid-March. We headed north from Kigali to Muzanze. We spent a few days in the shadows of the volcanoes. There are six volcanoes close to the boarder between Rwanda and the DRC that tower of the rolling hills. We stayed at a nice hostel where we were able to hike, weave baskets, and meet lots of interesting people. We also spent time at Lake Kivu in Kibuye. We swam and took a boat tour. Each day of retreat we had a bible study and discussed Liberation in praxis. It was a wonderful week of adventure, relaxing, and sharing.

The is a lot of work that needs to be done to get the building ready for weekly worship. Pastor Caleb's

friend moved from Kageyo to Kigali and was selling their beautiful home, the surrounding land, and their old chicken houses. The building that will be gutted, cleaned, and tiled is a large chicken house that was built but stood empty. Pastor has made sketches of the project and plans to start construction soon. The home on the property will be used as a guest house and meeting place for the congregation. We are all overjoyed!
