Dear Members and Friends of Zion's:

Throughout 2020, Zion's Council Members will be sharing a bit about themselves, their faith, and how they see God at work at Zion's. Joanna Guldin-Noll, our Council President and the director of Youth Choir, is the author of this month's feature article.

What brought you to Zion's, and how long have you been attending?

About 32 years ago, my parents walked through the front doors of Zion's with my sister Rachel and me in tow, and we've been attending since! The welcoming community here at Zion's played a large part in why John--my husband-- and I came back and settled down in Jonestown after his service in the Navy.

What keeps you here?

I believe that we are a congregation of people who are constantly striving to live God's word and be Jesus' hands and feet in our community. I want to be part of that mission!

Share a favorite memory of a worship service or event here.

There are so many! While it's not tied to one particular year, I love our 10:30 PM Christmas Eve Service. Singing "Silent Night" in candlelight (especially when the congregation sings four-part harmony a capella) fills me with joy and chokes me up every single time. I also love singing "Joy to the World" as the recessional and playing "The Hallelujah Chorus" on trumpet with my sisters, Dad, and John at the very end of the evening.

Share your favorite hymn/Bible verse/Bible story.

"Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go." - Joshua 1:9

What do you think are the biggest problems facing people today? (in our community/nation/world) How can the church address these problems?

Inequality, tribalism, and a lack of empathy are huge problems facing our community, nation, and world.

Time and time again, Jesus speaks about taking care of the widows, the imprisoned, the sick, the poor, and the outcast. Jesus always sides with the other and always flips society's expectations. How could we change our community and world if we challenged ourselves to see, treat, and love people the way Jesus sees, treats, and loves people? What if we challenged ourselves to really question and really change the systems and structures that hurt people, just as Jesus did? We cannot be people who go to church and profess to believe in one thing but go into our community, voting booths, and civic organizations where our actions show we believe something entirely different.

What's the one ministry at Zion's you always share with others? (Or a time you were especially proud of how Zion's lived in response to God's call)

I am completely biased when it comes to the youth choir. It is absolutely wonderful to see so many children and young adults who want to be part of the musical legacy and heritage of our church and who are invested and excited to be worship leaders and partners in ministry here at Zion's. Without exception (and I truly mean that!), every choir member is a hard worker who strives to do their very best-- which means not only singing the lyrics but understanding them too; not only singing the notes but working on phrasing, tone, and dynamics; and not only showing up for Sunday morning but coming

faithfully to practice every Wednesday night. They constantly want to be better and ask me questions about theology ("Why does our song say 'they nailed him to a tree' when the Bible says Jesus was nailed to a cross?"), our service ("Why do we take communion then?"), and other random stuff ("Why does the adult choir have binders but we don't?"). They suggest different ways to do the anthems (usually so that they are longer), and they delight in surprising the congregation whether that's singing with sunglasses on, adding an a capella verse, or learning the song in a different language. When I look at our youth choir, I see our church's next generation of musicians, pastors, lay leaders, and congregants. And I am really excited for what is to come.

What do you think God is calling our congregation towards?

I think God is calling us to continue reaching out into our community and breaking down barriers in order to be more welcoming and affirming to all of God's people. The explosion of Rejoicing Spirits and our coordinating ministries on Wednesday nights, our preschool, and All Church Sundays are testaments to that. We need to meet people where they are, secure in the knowledge that while some things in our church may change, God doesn't.

Thank you, Joanna, for sharing with us.



Highlights from Council and Congregational Meetings. *Please note, entire minutes can be picked up in the Gathering Area.*

January 20 Council Meeting

COUNCIL

- Council received copies of the book *Not Your Parent's Offering Plate* which will be the focus of our devotional/learning times this year. This book addresses what financial stewardship looks like in 2020, and how it needs to look different than how it looked in our parents' and grandparents' generations
- Council received with gratitude the 2019 year-end financial reports, and December's financial report. While we ended the year with a \$10,000+ deficit, we are grateful for the extra gifts we received in December, and for all the contributions made throughout the year. We look forward to the year to come, with hope in your generosity and trust in God's faithfulness.
- Council approved Pastor's 2020 housing designation at \$25,000 (within the compensation parameters approved in the 2020 budget), and designated that \$500 of the roughly \$800 we save each month by Pastor being on Tricare health insurance instead of the ELCA Portico Health Insurance will go towards the *Renew, Restore, Remain* Capital Campaign for 2020.
- Set Council priorities of: visibility within the congregation, telling the story(ies) of how God is at work in our congregation, and stewardship awareness and growth
- Agreed that Council members will write 'getting to know me' articles for the newsletter throughout 2020, to increase our visibility within the congregation and practice naming where we see God at work in the congregation
- Voted to waive the social hall fee for the "Taste of Jonestown", which will be hosted by the Jonestown Historical Society on April 26
- Finalized plans for the congregational dinner on January 26.

January 26 Congregational Meeting

- Enjoyed a delicious potluck meal. Thank you Rob and Michele McQuaide for coordinating the meal.
- Heard stories from several members of our congregation, Rejoicing Spirits community and preschool about how God is at work in and through Zion's.
- Unanimously approved the \$80,000 *Renew, Restore, Remain* Capital Campaign to purchase three new A/C units for the sanctuary, replace the A/C and heating unit in the Pastor's Office, repaint and repair the sanctuary walls/ceiling, re-coat the Social Hall roof, and pay off the remainder of the existing loan on the Social Hall.

February 17 Council Meeting

- Council discussed the introduction and first chapter of *Not Your Parent's Offering Plate*, including the importance of saying "thank you" for all the ways people contribute to ministry at Zion's, including financial gifts of every size. We also discussed the fact that, today, the church needs to compete for funds in ways it didn't have to do in previous years.
- Approved the purchase of four additional crosses for adult choir members from the Memorial Fund (each cross is \$21, plus shipping)

LENT 2020: Pass for the Planet

The overall theme for Lent 2020 at Zion's is "Caring for Creation". Our Wednesday night prayer services will focus on the hymn "For the Beauty of the Earth", with lessons from Jesus, who often uses nature imagery to explain the Kingdom of God, and our congregation members, who daily experience God in the great outdoors.

Sunday morning worship will focus on "Changed by God for the Sake of the World", with stories of how Jesus encounters people in scripture and forever changes their lives. Together we'll consider how God's encounter with each of us calls for *change* in our lives—how we treat one another, how we treat ourselves, and how we treat this beautiful world God has created.

Mission Ministry is also building on this discussion by asking Zion's members to reflect on our relationship with the earth, and particularly, how *single use plastics* have become an everyday reality that harms the earth in a variety of ways. These plastics are not biodegradable or, often, recyclable. We use them for a short while, and then they live in our earth for thousands of years. We encourage you to make a difference by 'sacrificing' the use of some of these items for Lent, and, hopefully, for longer!

Week 1 beginning March 1– REDUCE and REUSE plastic shopping bags. As often as you can, bring your own cloth bags when you go shopping (and remember to take them out of the car!) When that's not an option, be sure to reuse the plastic shopping bags—trying using them as waste bin liners, poop-scoopers, or bring them to church where we will re-use them when we pack Power Packs at Jonestown Elementary.

Week 2 beginning March 8 – Say "no thank you" to plastic straws. Single-use plastic, like straws, soda and coffee cup lids, and plastic silverware are used for a few moments, and then live thousands of years in landfills, oceans and waterways. Plastic does not biodegrade, but rather disintegrates into smaller pieces of plastic called microplastics that are consumed by animals and cause great harm. Try to saying "no thanks" to these items.

Week 3 beginning March 15 – Buy fresh, loose fruit and vegetables, not pre-packaged. Bring your own (maybe re-used) plastic bags to shop, and then store them in reusable containers. While this may be a challenge in March, consider trying it again in the summer months when local produce is readily available.

Week 4 beginning March 22 – Use a refillable water bottle instead of a plastic one. Like straws, plastic water bottles are used for a short while, and then live forever in creation. "Fast" from the convenience of 'grab and go' by investing in a reusable water bottle, and taking time to refill, wash, and reuse it. Overtime, this will save you money, too!

Week 5 beginning March 29 – Do not use Styrofoam cups or plates. Like other plastics, Styrofoam does not biodegrade, which means it has a LOOONNNGGG lifespan on our earth, even though it's use (as a take home container, or a picnic plate) often lasts a few days at most. The chemical processes used to manufacture Styrofoam also release dangerous gases into the air, which contributes to Styrofoam's harm. Instead, use real plates, or paper ones which are slightly better for the environment. When going out to eat, take your own Tupperware containers for leftovers.

*Finally, though not related to PLASTIC per say, we encourage you to participate in "Meatless Monday" by planning and eating meals that contain no meat. This isn't simply an effort to "save the animals": the production, transport, storage, cooking and wastage of food are **substantial** contributors to greenhouse gas emissions, which are destroying our ozone layer. Reducing meat consumption, even a little bit, is one way we can all care for creation (and save money! And, arguably, enjoy some health benefits!)*



Featured Section: Escuelita de Navidad

In each newsletter, this section will be for talking about something that I did that wasn't part of my daily routine, or something that stuck out to me.

Escuelita de Navidad literally means "Little Christmas School". The school attached to my host church organizes this event, which is very similar to a Vacation Bible School in the US, including that both take place during the summertime. Escuelita went from 9 to 12, Monday through Wednesday, with a closing program Thursday evening.

Everyone gathered in the auditorium each morning, and then the kids split up into groups by age. Myself and another leader walked around with the 3rd through 5th graders. Each age group did the stations in a different order.

We started off by going to recreation, where kids could play outside. They played tag, used hula-hoops and jump ropes, and kicked around the soccer balls. The first day was very hot, so the kids didn't want to play too much in the sun. The next two days were more fun, and the kids enjoyed the activities more.

Then we went to galletitas, or "little cookies". The leaders prepared sugar cookie dough, and the first day, the kids rolled out the dough and used little cookie cutters to cut out shapes. The leaders put the cookies on trays and baked them. The second day, the kids put icing and sprinkles on the baked cookies. The third day, they did a craft since the cookies were finished. They received the cookies Thursday evening.

After galletitas, the kids sat down and ate the snacks that they brought. Our final station was crafts. The first day, the kids colored the paper Nativity scene figurines, and the leaders helped arrange the figurines on cardboard.

The second day, the kids made a craft Christmas tree. The third day, they made candleholders out of paper bags by tracing shapes and poking holes in the outlines using pushpins. I helped prepare a lot of those crafts a few weeks in advance, so it was fun to watch them enjoy the crafts.

Finally, we all returned to the auditorium for a few announcements, a song, and then dismissal. Thursday evening, the program included a skit, which had a very nice Christmas message. The kids were split into 4 groups: red, blue, yellow, and green. Each "land" was made up entirely of its color, and only that color was correct. A white brick landed in the middle of each land, and was consequently kicked out of each one. The brick was a representation of Jesus becoming human and changing what humans believed was correct. After the skit, all the kids gathered around a manger and sang Noche de Paz (Silent Night).

 - o A word used very commonly here
- Verano "summer"
 - o It's currently summer here, and I miss the winter
- Todo tránqui? "All good?"
 - Used as a form of greeting
- Merienda "snack time"
 - Usually mid-afternoon snack since dinner is at 9 or later
- Tereré cold infused tea drink (not direct translation)
 - A drink more common in Northern Argentina, and I am obsessed with it; it is very refreshing when it's hot out
- Murga theatrical music genre (not direct translation)
 - Another volunteer and I got to watch a rehearsal; in February, our cohort will get to see them perform
